Marjorie Heier, MD, FAAFP has been chosen at the AAFP Humanitarian of the year. ACLF/NCCL Highlights



A Town Hall discussion with AAFP's elected leaders, sessions on member engagement, and a plenary session tackling the topic of fighting physician burnout through advocacy. Other breakout discussions focused on continuing medical education accreditation, Medicaid waivers, navigating difficult advocacy topics, health equity, media training, and medical coding, just to name a few. The SDAFP staff participated in several onsite meetings with the American Board of Family Medicine (ABFM) and the Family Medicine Chapter Alliance. Attendees from South Dakota joined leaders from the ABFM and the Alaska, North Carolina, and Ohio chapters for a networking dinner.

ABFM 5 Year Cycle



Let me break down this change that the ABFM has made. To my understanding the 5 year cycle replaces the 3 year cycle. You will need to complete 200 CME hours and 60 MOC hours every 5 years, rather than 150 CME hours and 50 MOC hours every 3 years.

The second and perhaps more important change is you can either do the longitudinal questions, 25 per year completing 100 every 5 year cycle or, you can take the test, 300 questions, every 5 years. Yes, you are reading that right. If you decide not to do the 25 question per year longitudinal assessment, you will be required to take the exam every 5 years. Or if you do the questions, but fail, you will need to do the test every 5 years. These are big changes are some pretty big changes. You

will not need to make this change until your next 10 year cycle. So if you met your exam requirement in 2022 you will stay in the 3 year cycle requirement until 2032. Then you will transition to the 5 year. So for those of you waiting for this years transition, you will be the first to start the 5 year cycle.
